

December 10, 2021 - Day 4

It sure was dark this morning.

Calm and quiet. No wind, or current so leaving the dock was super easy. Mark was able to change out the fender, untie and take off with ease.

Leaving Norwalk Harbor, although overcast was nice. There was a lot to look at. Several tiny islands with homes on them, fishing boats heading out for a days work, hunters leaving for a morning of duck hunting.



Did not take long before we heard a gun



shot in the distance. Hopefully that means success for a hunter, too bad for the duck though! About one mile off the coast, in Long Island Sound is the Norwalk Islands. There are more than 25 islands, partly submerged boulders, reefs and mudflats along a six-mile streath.

The Sheffield Island Lighthouse is an 1868 10-room historic building that can be rented for private events, and you can buy tickets to tour it. seaport.org



Tavern Island is a private island with a main house, caretakes cottage and boat house with guest quarters a teahouse and a mainland garage/cottage and room with parking. (I don't have a photo but it is impressive if you want to check it out privateislandsonline.com)

In case you want to buy your own private island, you could go to that site and start shopping!

Greens Ledge Light is newer than the Sheffield Island Lighthouse. It was not put into place in the Norwalk Harbor until 1896 due to the increase in commercial traffic in and out of the harbor. Recently receiving a huge renovation and restoration there are plans to host educational tours and will be (if not already) equipped with environmental monitoring equipment. Lighthousefriends.com has an enourmous amount of history on this lighthouse if you are interested.



Today is a short cruising day. Leaving at 7 am and estimating an arrival time of 12 – 1pm into Brooklyn. We are docking at One 15 Brooklyn Marina.

We have to travel through the East River, pass by Kings Point where the US Merchant Maritime Academy is located, Laguardia airport, under the Robert F Kennedy Bridge, the Ed Koch Queensboro Bridge, over the Queens Midtown Tunnel, under a few more bridges including the Brooklyn Bridge.

This morning around 7:45 am we passed by a sail boat just outside the harbor. Guess what!?! They docked just a few slips down from us at the One15 Brooklyn Marina! Crazy! Right?!



It was about 9:00 a.m. when the manhatten skyline came into view. It was a long way away but boy did our adrenline spike and the excitement level was high!

By 10:48 we were cruising under the Bronx-White Stone Bridge with La Quardia Airport on our left. The planes were so low, creating an enormous rumble over our heads. The planes were taking off and landing within what felf like seconds apart.



Plenty of vessels of all sizes traveling through the East River in and out of New York's harbors.

We travelled North of the tiny North Brother Island on advice from Mark's fellow boaters rather than follow the ferry lane in between North & South Brother Island. It is a narrow passage totally doable but not when meeting a high speed ferry and other pleasure boaters.

We passed under Hell Gate Bridge through Hell Gate which is a narrow tidal straight in the East River where the current can reach flows up to 5+knots. We took video. The bridge itself is a railroad bridge.



The Roosevelt Island Tramway is so cool I never heard of this before. It spans the East River travels at approximately 16 mph. Connects North Brooklyn to Manhatten. It opened in 1976 and is the first aerial tramway in North America.



Roosevelt Island is on our left. Passing by this 2-mile island only 800 feet wide we saw hospitals, Blackwell Island Lighthouse, the FDR Four Freedoms State Park and the Rendwick Ruins, aka The Small Pox Hospital. Opened in 1856 and now abandoned and fallen into ruin.





