February 10, 2022 Beaufort, NC to Belhaven, NC via ICW

We left Beaufort this morning around 7:30 a.m.

I heard Mark start the engines around 7:05 a.m. He unhooked us and we were underway by the time I came up to the salon.

We had dolphins swim with us just a couple of miles north of Beaufort. They did not stay long. One or two minutes.





We were the only ones disturbing Mother Nature's glory this morning as we cruised north on Adams Creek. Minus our engine; there was no noise. Calm, quiet, and the water was like glass.



I wonder what the story is behind this?

9:08 a.m.

We met this tug pushing a barge. It is headed south into Adams Creek as we are leaving it and coming into Neuse River. Oriental, NC is straight ahead as we come out of Adams Creek.

Mark stated that he liked Adams creek. There was a lot to look at: Large marinas, large homes, small RV Parks, a lot of wooded areas. Enough to keep it interesting.

Neuse River is a wide river. Fortunately for us today the wind is calm and the sun is shining. Just makes cruising that much more enjoyable so we decided to keep on cruising.

Water changed as we were coming from the wide Neuse River at where it meets the Pamlico Sound and with Ball Island ahead of us the water is flowing from the Atlantic into the Bay River. We will cross the mouth of the Bay River and follow the ICW through the Pamlico River, and the Pungo River.

11:22 a.m. We met S/V Allure, Portsmouth, VA Did we see Allure in Portsmouth? Maybe?






I drove the boat today. Mark sat back on the mezzanine for a bit, and the sofa a bit. I had the wheel through a portion of the Pamlico River into the Pungo River. I botched the 90-degree turn in the Pungo River to keep on course with the ICW. I oversteered and had us off course by a few degrees. (maybe more than a few)

RE Mayo update: We got 2-bags of shrimp, 2-packages of crab cakes, and one package of crab balls.
No scallops this time either.

The weather and water are very favorable today so Mark decided to skip Belhaven and cruise the Alligator River – Pungo River Canal. The goal here is to get through Albemarle Sound with little wind which is the forecast for tomorrow.

The canal is very straight with a few course corrections needed from time to time. It is very quiet. No birds, no houses to look at, an occasional bridge to go under; all in all it looks dead. Not even a cellphone signal could survive out here, Mark says with a chuckle.



It has been a great day to be on the water. A long day. Not much to report as far as scenery, boat traffic, or wildlife sightings. Luckily we are still enjoying each other's company so good conversation broken up by my work, engine room checks, etc. we are happy to be out here.



We are almost at our anchorage. at 5 o'clock and we have been moving since 7:05 a.m. We are tired. Even when there is not a lot going on in the outside world, inside Valkyrie plenty is going on. Keeping a close eye on both IPads, the Radar, water depth, and of course any other vessels on the water. Today they just happen to be few and far between.

Mark revved up the engines as we neared the end of the canal took a few notes on fuel consumption ratios, etc.




Anchoring was very peaceful. Valkyrie was the only boat in sight. Having no cell phone reception was kind of nice. We were able to be off-grid for the evening.

One bar of service was just enough to text. Jordan knew we were safe and knew our position. Other than that, no Facebook, no Netflix, etc.




At the end of Adams Creek is the Neuse River.
