

February 12, 2022 Saturday, Day 67

Free city dock, Chesapeake, VA to Portsmouth, VA

Yes, we are headed back to Portsmouth, VA. We have prepaid time left to use up at Ocean Yacht Marina. Not that we have to use it but it is a good place to be with snow in the forecast for tomorrow and we want to watch the Superbowl with the comforts of electricity and heat.

This morning was 68 degrees and warmed up and top off at 70 degrees. Mark and I had our morning coffee then headed out for a $2\frac{1}{2}$ mile walk in the wooded paths along the water. The same walking path I did with Haleigh the last time we were here only Mark and I went a bit further.





I got my foot a little muddy, but just a little.

Upon return, I gathered a short shopping list and walked the ½ mile to the grocery store. Empty shelves were not a welcome sight. Covid is still effecting us.



We did a 1 o'clock bridge opening with the Great Bridge Swing Bridge then directly into the lock. I got put on line duty in the cockpit with Haleigh. 


Just after passing under the Veterans Bridge, there is so much activity here. Cranes, barges, processing plants. It is full of thriving industries.

The project will widen I-64 from four to six lanes and add one high-occupancy toll (HOT) lane in each direction. The new High Rise Bridge will be built adjacent to the existing one to carry the three lanes of I-64 west traffic over the Elizabeth River. The existing High Rise Bridge will continue to operate during the construction. Once the new bridge is complete, the existing High Rise Bridge will carry three lanes of I-64 east traffic.-roads/bridges.com

We learned yesterday that there are several days that all passages under this bridge will be closed. Thankfully today is not one of them!



Besides the lonely pelican we saw in the Chesapeake Bay, Mark and I were questioning if we had seen pelicans in the Portsmouth area. I am thinking yes when I was videoing the James River and the Navy Ships, but Mark and I also remember being excited to see them in Belhaven, NC. The marina manager had told us that he typically sees them in the Fall and not this many.

Well, there is no mistake that on this beautiful winter day, there are pelicans here!



Gilmerton Highway bridge closed is 36' clearance which we can successfully fit under. However: Norfolk #7 when closed, but normally open is closed and only has a 7' clearance.

Mark is just about to call the bridge operator on the radio but; there is a southbound vessel that the bridge operator was communicating with and 'he is working on it.'

This is a train bridge. It's 2 o'clock and we have been waiting for a few minutes and have no choice but to wait we cannot clear this bridge.

So idling Valkyrie with 2 – 1991 Detroit 2-stroke diesel engines with over 3000 hours. They do not like to idle for a long time. They get a little gummy, gunked up, clogged with carbon, oily gunk, and basically fester in their own filth.

Last night waiting over 1 ½ hour for the swing bridge was not ideal so when the swing bridge opened we hit it hard so to speak and got the RPMs back up to help blow out whatever filth that had gathered before arriving at the dock to shut the engines down for the night.

Sécurité, Sécurité #7 bridge will be opening momentarily. 2:13 p.m. and we are through the bridge.



Liquid petroleum. – stored here. Perhaps for the Navy ships?








It is 2:25 p.m. and Mark has called the marina and is making arrangements for our arrival.
