The U.S. Navy adopted this practice and made it part of the Rules and Regulations in 1843. Today you can find instructions detailing the procedures for Colors in the Navy Regulations, Chapter 12: "The ceremonial hoisting and lowering of the national ensign [American Flag] at 0800 and sunset at a naval command ashore or aboard a ship of the Navy not underway shall be known as morning and evening colors, respectively, and shall be carried out as prescribed in this article. -info from several google searches combined.

We can hear the sunset Colors sounding off in the distance. We were reading and editing Feb. 9 blog, but stopped and listened. For me, it is hard to describe the feeling hearing this invokes. Here in Portsmouth, it has become a welcomed part of the day.
