


January 21, 2022 – Friday, Day 44 Charleston, SC

These two photos are our view from the back of the boat.



My lunch break entertainment was watching this container ship come in out of the fog and get escorted by two tug boats up into the Cooper River under the bridge.







Although I did not have my camera accessible, Mark and I did watch a container ship turn around in the harbor. Literally, like a U-turn on a highway.

It is cold and rainy so we are not leaving the boat today. Some area businesses closed down early. I know the SC Aquarium closed at 2 p.m. today due to weather conditions.

We ordered pizza delivery. 3-Friday nights, 3-different cities, 3-different Papa Johns. So good.

We have Friday night pizza night, it is our thing. We have pizza and a movie. Papa John's had not been a pizza place that would come to mind as we list the possible options however, now they are. The pizza has been so good. Timely arrival, friendly drivers, a lot of customizable crust and topping options, and it arrives hot and delicious.

Our evening view out the back. The two dredge boats which we can hear operating, 24-hours per day. And this container ship. Sometimes they have to anchor in the harbor and await a Pilot or Tug to become available to escort them in.

Our neighbor that arrived last night: the R/V Savannah from Savannah Georgia. This vessel is part of the Skidaway Institute of Oceanography. It is a marine science research institute located on Skidaway Island near Savannah and is a unit of the University of Georgia. I believe a lot of the research is reef-related using cutting-edge bathymetric side-scan sonar and high-resolution geographic positioning systems (GPS).



Haleigh thinks I am obsessed with the big ships that we have encountered on our trip. Of course, we saw a lot of shipping in the Chesapeake Bay, and Portsmouth, VA, but the size of the ships that come into Charleston are mega huge. Yes, as you will soon realize, I am a bit over the top with taking photos, and videos of them. Daily, falling into a routine of kids, work, relationships, etc., do you think about where your stuff comes from? Yes, since COVID and the consequences of this virus leaving us with empty store shelves, car shortages, etc. most of us have become more aware of the shipping process and the delivery of goods. SC Ports are looking to open a SMART Chassis pool in 2023. Charleston is the 6<sup>th</sup> biggest container port in the US by cargo value. Increasing its capacity by over 30% with an opening of a new terminal back in 2009. It has 6 terminals between Charleston, North Charleston, and Mount Pleasant.
