Day 12 - Tuesday, December 12, 2023 - Chincoteague Island, VA

What a gorgeos day. A little breezy but not enough to stop me from a 3.4

mile walk along Main St. and then over to the Veterans Memorial Park.

Vetrean's Memorial Park is open to the public. It has an amazing playground for kids with a junglegym, basket ball court, ramps for kayakers, and thankfully open public restrooms.

My main object of walking to the park was for the view which included the Asateague Island Lighthouse.

Little bit of Trivia:

The Assateague lighthouse, built in 1867, stands

142 feet high. The brick tower has two 1000-watt lamps that double flash every five seconds. At its base, the lighthouse is 27 feet in diameter and about 15 feet in diameter at the top. An internal spiral stairway leads up to the top. The lighthouse is located on the Virginia side of

Assateague Island, a windswept barrier island that serves as the Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge. https://www.virginia.org/listing/assateague-lighthouse/4906/

Along the way, I saw the ponies out grazing at the Carnival barns. I passed by a couple of cemeteries. One caught my eye and I wondered into it a little bit. Most all the headstones date to the 1860's.



Little bit of Trivia:

During the 17th century, the Island was used for livestock grazing. By 1800, families had settled on the Island full-time. These settlers learned the importance of our natural resources; oysters, clams, crabs, and fish. A seafood industry developed with trade to New York and Philadelphia.

NASA's Wallops Flight Facility provides agile, low-cost flight and launch range services to meet government and commercial sector needs for accessing flight regimes worldwide from the Earth's surface to the moon and beyond.

To put it in easier terms:

Tucked away on Virginia's Eastern Shore, NASA's **Wallops** Flight Facility plays an incredibly important role in our understanding of earth and space science.

The Navy signed a \$1.9 million annual contract with NASA to begin aircraft carrier landing practices at Wallops. The program will have pilots landing on and taking off from Wallops runways equipped with lights and graphics to resemble the decks of carriers.

There will be 20,000 touch-and-go exercises per year at Wallops with the E-2 and C-2 aircraft, the only non-jet airplanes that land on carriers, officials said.

Mark took advantage of this beautiful day in a different way. The 150-gallon supply is used for drinking, cleaning, cooking, and everything else water-related. It has been 10 days since we have done laundry. Don't worry we stocked up on those unmentionables before we left •

We are here in Chincoteague for a couple of more days so the discussion had to happen; how are we going to stretch out our water? I do have disposable plates & forks we could use for meals; I could buy drinking water. We are already at every other day showers; so where else could

we conserve? There isn't.
One possibility is to ask the town's marina if their water is on. We could try to make water. Or, we will have to make it stretch until we arrive in Chesapeake, VA.

It was determined that making water is not going to be an option. There is too much floating seaweed and the water looks dirty.

Waiting until Chesapeake, VA is not an option.



So we will have to try our best to get in touch with the town marina and pray they can provide us with water. Stay tuned.

We reviewed our onboard fire safety and decided a second fire extinguisher is needed in our closet. We had one in the liquor cabinet which isn't necessary because we have one hanging on the wall next to it

Our inventory of fire extinguishers is plentiful. One (if not two) in each bedroom. One in the main salon, one under the kitchen sink, and the engine room have a built-in fire extinguishing system. In addition, we have a portable foam extinguisher in the engine room and a portable dry chemical extinguisher. On the flybridge, there is one under the sofa just at the top of the stairs and there is one in the tender.

Dinner was leftover Mexican casserole. After a 1.5-hour conversation with our youngest, we watched Santa Claus is Coming to Town and then went to bed.
